Celebrates 250 Years

n Sunday, May 1, 2022, Turning Point United Methodist Church is commemorating a significant event in the life of Methodism. 250 years ago in 1772 — Turning Point's ancestor, First Methodist Church of Trenton was founded. Turning Point is the result of a 2007 merger between First UMC of New Jersey and St. Paul UMC. This foundational church is a direct descendent of that 1772 historic church. The name Turning Point was chosen for two main reasons: not only was Trenton, NJ a turning point in the Revolutionary War, but also because of the mission to lead people to a turning point in their spiritual lives.

Bishop John Schol, District Superintendent Hector A. Burgos, and Pastor Rupert A. Hall, Jr. will lead the celebration on May 1 with a worship service at 3:00 pm. The event will be held at Turning Point UMC: 15 S. Broad St. in Trenton, NJ. All living former pastors and spouses,

including those of the former St. Paul UMC, have been invited and will participate in the opening processional. This celebrational event is open to the public.

Those in attendance will have the opportunity to observe a display of archives from the church and it's history. The oldest archives date back to the late 18th century and also include

memorabilia from the 19th and 20th centuries, with some through the early 21st century. Following the worship service, there will be a reception in the fellowship hall of the church.

This Trenton church is believed to be one of the oldest Methodist Churches in New Jersey, as well as one of the

As Easter Approaches, Be Prepared for the Follow Up...

he high and holy season has come, and Easter is quickly approaching. While most of us have great things underway for Easter, I offer the reminder that this is the time of year when we see newcomers and the return of people we haven't seen in quite some time. Many churches are also reopening their sanctuaries for the first time since 2020. This is an exciting time for both the church and community!

As we prepare to welcome these new and familiar faces, I encourage you to put a plan in place for visitor follow-up. A major goal in receiving visitors, both in-person and online, is not just to track their attendance, but to gather contact information, follow up, and stay in touch with them. People are far more likely to return if you thank them for their visit, and twice more likely to keep coming back if someone remembers their name the next time they visit.

A simple way of offering a note of thanks is a postcard or email. In the last church I served, we found great success in having those who serve in hospitality

A MESSAGE FROM OUR BISHOP

Mission — A Key Ingredient for Successful Leadership

uccessful leaders lead toward something. Churches, ministries, and organizations without direction flounder and eventually fail. There are three things that are essential to successful leadership: *vision*, *mission*, and *goals*. Last month I shared with you about vision. Today I will talk with you about mission.

While vision provides direction and inspiration, mission provides purpose, focus, and alignment.

What is Mission

Mission is used in different ways. We use the word *mission* to describe an activity when helping others, or a cause, a purpose we give money to, or the purpose of a church or organization. In this article I am using the word mission to describe the purpose of a church, organization, or ministry.

A mission is a brief phrase that describes the key activity or purpose of a congregation or ministry. It provides what leadership focus on achieving and aligns people, resources, and activities to accomplish the purpose of the church or ministry. The following are examples of mission statements.

Recruit and develop transformational leaders to make disciples of Jesus Christ and grow vital congregations for the transformation of the world. This is the mission statement of the collective United Methodists of Greater New Jersey (GNJ). The mission statement is the first five words,

recruit and equip transformational leaders, and the remainder of the phrase is what transformational leaders do. Recruit and develop transformational leaders focus and aligns people, resources, and activities of GNJ. GNJ is shaping its budget, staffing, and activities with the singular question, will this recruit and develop transformational leaders. GNJ as an organization does not directly make disciples or grow vital congregations. This work is done by congregations. Instead, GNJ develops lay and clergy leaders to be transformative leaders so that disciples are being made, congregations grow in vitality, and world transformation is experienced in and through congregations.

trict superintendents, and bishop when making appointments. When the cabinet considers different churches and pastors for an appointment, it asks the questions: which churches have the greatest probability of making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world, and which pastor will maximize this possibility? Sometime the cabinet is faced with the difficult decision of whether a particular pastor will better serve the overall mission of the church, making disciples and world transformation in one church over another church, but the question becomes: which pastor will better maximize making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world?

To know and serve God. This is a congregation's mission. It focuses the time,

Maximize disciple making. This is the mission statement of the cabinet, our dis-

To know and serve God. This is a congregation's mission. It focuses the time, treasure, and talents of people to deepen their relationship with God, and equip and support them to serve God. This is a mission statement that can adapt with the congregation and people as they grow and mature in their faith with an ever-changing community mission field. Some churches would like to expand a mission statement by providing further descriptors of what people are to know or the types of service, but this leads to narrowing God's possibility for the congregation, or its ministry groups, or its individuals. The concise nature actually expands possibilities based on an individual's level of faith development and talent, passion, and ability for service. It also

provides a powerful question for focusing resources and ministry — will this better help us know and serve God?

Gather for fellowship and learning and support members in daily living. This is a mission of a small group and while a little long at 11 words, it clarifies why the group meets. It also provides a paradigm for what they do when they meet — begin with fellowship, engage in learning, identify life commitments in the coming week, and covenant for how the group will support one another in their living during the week.

While vision provides direction and inspiration, the mission statement provides what you will do to move toward God's preferred future. The mission statement focuses and aligns how you will use the resource of time, talent, and treasure to accomplish the purpose of the congregation.



Pastor Jay Brown from Wesley UMC Shares the Heart of the Church

WEST BERLIN,

esley United Methodist Church in West Berlin, NJ may be representative of a small church congregation, but it is indeed a mighty one at heart. This church has been able to make a big impact in their local community, whether it be their food pantry, prayer shawls to the sick, or new technology to reach out to others. Striving to bring people back into the life of the church, they have been able to welcome 12 new members into their church home, according to Jay Brown, Certified Lay Minister — SY Pastor/Order of St. Luke of Wesley UMC.

"Our church currently has 40 active members on its rolls. Due to COVID-19, attendance has averaged between 25 to 30 people. Some of the new members are transfers from local churches that I have served in the past such as Glendale and Lucaston and some are Associate members from other UM churches who regularly attend our services. Most came by word of mouth because of the openness and welcoming nature of the Wesley congregation. For a small neighborhood church, we truly offer 'radical hospitality' to all visitors and attendees," he said.

Jay, who has been at Wesley UMC since July 2020, was District Superintendent Rev. Myrna Bethke's last appointment. He has served as the supply pastor at the following churches since 2008: Frances Childs in Collingswood, Glendale and Lucaston in Voorhees, Mt. Zion in Wenonah, and prior to his current assignment served at Billingsport UMC in Paulsboro, NJ for 6 years.

"I was the GNJ Conference Lay Leader from 2000 to 2008 and served as a Director on the General Board of Global Missions and the Standing Committee on Central Conference Matters from 2008 to 2016. In 2008, I started and coordinated the GNJ CLM Program for ten years," he added.

According to Jay Brown, Wesley UMC has a long, rich history, dating back to when the church began in the spring of 1899. At that time, it was called Wesley Methodist Episcopal Church.

"Luke Bate had donated the property to the church and Harry Minck was the attorney and realtor who donated his time to make it happen. The church building was dedicated on November 20, 1899. In 1903, the church building was rebuilt. The church building is located on the corners of Bate and Pine Avenues in West Berlin," said Jay.

Today, church members reside in various South Jersey towns including Atco, Bellmawr, Berlin, Glendora, Clementon, Lindenwold, Glassboro, Runnemede, West Berlin, and Williamstown.

"Our older but very spirited church members engage in many local mission projects such as its own local food pantry that serves the community and beyond as needed. During the recent tornado events this past year, the church provided for families in the Mullica Hill area as requested by families and friends," he said. "We also have a prayer shawl ministry as well as a blanket ministry who handmakes blankets for low-income seniors in the community. We collect gently used footwear for a project called 'Soles for Soles' and we have recently become the storage site for the Conference Disaster Relief trailer in South Jersey for emergency supplies."

In addition to these ministries, Wesley UMC has a weekly Bible study and prayer group on Tuesday nights at 7pm and a Monday meeting of the former "UMW", now known as "Women in Faith."


Jay said that his greatest joy at Wesley UMC has been having a congregation who has been very receptive to having a CLM as a pastor.

"They are open to change and new ways of doing ministry in the 21st century. I personally love blended services and they allowed me to share my conference and general church experiences with them to help them grow." he added.

Jay Brown continued that Wesley UMC is always looking for new members and is "very open and loving and want to share the love of Jesus Christ with all we meet.'

"Hopefully we are not that different from other churches in that we have the same goals of helping others to be spiritually fed and grow, and would like to serve in some humble way to help make disciples of Jesus Christ."



each week fill out the thank-you notes. We placed blank postcards (with the church's information) in the office and the hospitality area. We trained volunteers that if they met someone new, they would offer them a connect card to fill out, and after church, the volunteer would write a 2 or 3 sentence personal note to thank them for coming and invite them to return.

This formed new relationships with new attendees, that volunteers were in direct contact with and offered the chance to add a personal touch (Ex. We'd love to have your grandson in children's church; or next time we'll make sure we have enough decaf around.). The personal notes should be simple, short, and sweet.

This same method works for your online hosts/ushers who are greeting people online in the chat and comments of the service. Invite people to complete an online connect card (which can be made easily using a free google form) and have the online hosts draft personal messages to visitors they've connected with during the service. Have designated volunteers and/or staff ready to compose and mail out thank-you postcards or emails within 48 hours of the service. Then what?

Having a workflow in place for the visitor response process in your church is a very helpful tool. Many membership databases have capability to do workflows. If not, or if you don't have a membership

database, Planning Center People is a great and free option to use and implement workflows through. Workflows help get the "every-member commitment" active in growing the church. An example of basic visitor response workflow is:

- 1: Thanks for Visiting Message Expected Response Time: 48 hours
- 2: Join us for worship Expected Response Time: The Saturday before the next service
- 3: Email/Text about Small groups After 2nd Visit
- 4: 1 month follow up Ask if they have questions about the church or would like to meet with a pastor

After they've attended three times, a workflow would look like:

- 1: Phone call from Group Leader or Staff
- 2: Update Profile Information
- 3: Invite to Membership Class
- 4: Follow Up Email

The fact remains that the average r eturn rate for visitors is only about 10%. A large part of that is because people feel they weren't noticed, their presence wasn't appreciated, or they left feeling as much like an outsider as when they arrived. So, I invite and encourage you to put some energy behind what happens next after first time visitors. The church of Jesus Christ can and will grow if we continue to be intentional about embracing those we are encountering and welcoming them into the fold.

A Pandemic-Born Nonprofit Supports NJ Community with Food, Clothing, and More

ev. Elaine Wing, a pastor at Calvary United Methodist Church (CUMC), has a long history of working with churches and street ministries to combat food insecurity. Early in the Covid-19 Pandemic, she was approached to help families in the area by Karen DeMarco, president of the Food Brigade. It was an easy "Yes!" for both Rev. Elaine and the church council. Karen had a contact who was willing to provide boxes of fresh produce to people in need. She connected with CUMC and asked the church to serve as a distribution site. With CUMC and church volunteers ready to go, produce was organized so that families could come to shop for free.

Karen and her husband, Carmine DeMarco, continued to make connections with food distribution programs and boxes of produce were replaced by USDA and NJ State boxes of food, including gallons of milk. Every week, regardless of the weather, pallets of food boxes and milk were distributed from the church parking lot. The average distribution was well over 1,200 boxes and nearly 800 gallons of milk. Individuals, families, and representatives of food pantries would fill their cars, trucks, and vans with boxes of fresh food and milk. The church refrigerators became a mini dairy, the freezers became meat lockers, and the kitchen counters served as a produce store.

Members of the two churches Rev. Elaine serves, CUMC in Dumont and Church of the Good Shepherd in Bergenfield became part of the distribution chain. They brought food to neighbors and co-workers who could benefit

from a little help and support through the blessing of food. The church congregations and the DeMarco's worked together, expanding the circle wide to include more recipients and volunteers.

Dumont's Social Services department became a partner in the process during the height of the pandemic. CUMC enlisted a local scout troop to distribute flyers in English

and Spanish throughout the Borough of Dumont, informing families of the available food assistance.

"It was an amazing effort by individuals and groups — all working together to

meet the needs of families in the greater Dumont area. Recipients became volunteers and one person connected us with a Spanish-speaking community of immigrants who desperately needed our help." Said Rev. Elaine Wing. program. In 2020, the sanctuary pews were filled with coats and families were given a time of private shopping to find what they needed. The next year in 2021, the fellowship hall became the distribution site for clothing do-

When the weather turned cold, the two UMC congregations expanded their annual winter clothing distribution to accommodate the larger list of recipients connected through the food

nated and organized by a plethora of interfaith organizations, Dumont Social Services, and church congregations.

The DeMarco's made the decision to create a non-profit organization: The Food Brigade. Rev. Elaine served as a member on the initial Board of Trustees to further connect the church, the Food Brigade, and the community. The Food Brigade was given space within the church, which they quickly outgrew, and a larger room was turned into an exclusive space for their growing needs. Food distribution methods evolved with the availability of food programs and grants. When the school lunch program was stopped in the Dumont public schools because of the pandemic, the Food Brigade and CUMC stepped in and distributed boxes of food geared to provide breakfast and lunch to school children in the area.

The Food Brigade Inc. is a nonprofit corporation of the State of New Jersey incorporated on 10/1/20, and is a 501(c)(3) tax-exempt public charity. GNJ Resource "Breakthrough Worship Series" Goes Global


reakthrough Worship Series are created by Greater New Jersey (GNJ) staff and leaders for GNJ churches. When you've got a good thing going, why keep it to yourself? All over the United States and even into Canada, churches of different sizes and denominations are discovering how the GNJ resources, replete with sermon outlines, small groups, and worship resources, can transform their worship and ministries.

When the resource of Breakthrough Series was originally launched, the idea was to provide consistent worship and small group experiences across our GNJ conference, while also freeing up time for clergy and congregational leaders to do more hands-on ministry. Existing as a large time-saver, Breakthrough was expected to be most useful to smaller churches with part-time pastors in GNJ.

Little did we know that churches across the country would be picking it up. In the South, Beulah UMC in Valley, AL, pastored by Rev. Katrina Paxson. In the Mid-West, Rev. Trevor Vaughn's two United Methodist churches outside of Des Moines, IA. In the Pacific Northwest, Trinity UMC in Wenatchee, WA, pastored by Rev. Julie Price. Breakthrough is making its way across our United Methodist connection, largely by word of mouth and the magic of Facebook support groups for clergy!

Yet, it is not only United Methodists who deeply appreciate the sharing of resources. Breakthrough is currently being used across several denominations, including churches that belong to the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and the United Church of Canada.

The foundation of the series is strong enough that, as noted by Rev. Debora Rolls of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, Peterborough, Ontario, "They help to spark creativity in us and then we make it our own." This Lent, Rev. Rolls' church is working together to create a mosaic from

broken pottery. The idea was inspired by the Breakthrough 2022 Lent series *Drink* from the Fountain of Grace.

When asked about using a United Methodist resource in a Lutheran church, Rev. Paul Block of New Song Church, NV says that while occasionally he needs to

make tweaks for his context, the series provide a good starting point and help tremendously with planning. The Rev. Paul Hutchison of Eglinton St. George United Church in Toronto, Ontario likes Breakthrough because, he states, "most 'packaged' worship bundles do not honor inclusivity and diversity of individuals and images of God. Rather than invest in something with a poorly laid foundation, I often throw it away. Breakthrough

er into the series with them. It definitely helps save time with the materials ready for you." Likewise, Rev. Block noted using the small groups alongside the worship series makes the service more meaningful. Rev. Rolls appreciates how the small groups can be easily led by laypeople— an important design feature in all Breakthrough series.

With the changing demographics of churches all over North America, it seems







As a little boy with a big personality and even bigger dreams, Bob Goff had lots of questions, and they didn't go away when he grew up. It wasn't until he learned just how





oldest in the country. Francis Asbury, one of the first Bishops in Methodism, was part of the laying of the cornerstone. Turning Point UMC is a direct descendent of that original church.

The church building where worship currently takes place every week was built in 1894. In 1956 it sustained an arson fire that destroyed much of the interior, but the main walls of the building were not damaged. By 1958, the interior had been rebuilt. It is the fourth building in the history of the church and the second building at this Broad Street location. The former brick building was torn down to make way for its present structure. The first two buildings were smaller and at a different location in Trenton, on Broad Street and Academy Street.

Among the nineteen original members of the church were Conrad Kotts, Alexander Carr, George Ely, Joseph Toy, John Fitch, and other UMC familiar names. John Fitch, the inventor of the steamboat, was memorialized by the City of Trenton.

Today, Turning Point UMC is very active in helping those in Trenton who need food and clothing. Every week, people are welcome to come for meals at the church and receive groceries to take home. In addition to food, the clothing ministry strives to help those who need something to wear. Twice a month, diapers are handed out to parents of young children. Turning Point's congregation is most grateful to the many churches and organizations who regularly contribute food, clothing, and monetary gifts.

To further celebrate the anniversary year, the church is planning a gala banquet in the fall, as well as a special concert. You can also read a recap of the May 1rst celebration in the May issue of *The Relay*.
