ach year, bishops and district superintendents reach out to The General Commission on the Status and Role of Women (GCSRW) for guidance on how to navigate different situations regarding women, equality, and power.

We know that local churches still struggle accepting clergywomen. We

know that there is sexual misconduct in our churches, and we know that there continues to be inequality and a lack of representation within the church structure. GCSRW exists to challenge The United Methodist Church in the full inclusion and participation of women at all levels of the life and

mission of the church (¶2102, BOD). It is also our mandate to hold the church accountable when it fails to live out its purpose. In order to fulfill our calling, GCSRW focuses on four key pillars of service: monitoring, sexual ethics, leadership, and education.

The Impact of Breakthrough Worship Series on Ministry

n the most recent GNJ Leadership Survey, 71% of respondents said they have participated in Breakthrough, and it has helped their congregation become more vital. 

A MESSAGE FROM OUR BISHOP

Leaders are born, right?

verything was coming together for Erica. She had just finished up her next to last day of work and was headed to her obstetrician for her scheduled checkup. She had only one day left with her former employer and then she could focus all of her attention on delivering in two weeks her child. Upon examination, the doctor said, "you are about to deliver, I want you to go to the hospital now." "I can't," Erica said, "I have one day left of work and I need to finish some things up." "NOW!" the doctor replied. That evening Erica had a baby boy, Kobe. Today, Erica MartinezSantos is the administrative assistant for the Bishop's office and shares her story as a reminder that in the midst of challenges, God delivers.

Throughout my ministry and leadership, people have invariably asked me how I knew something or where I learned to lead. From that time forward, I have become a student of leadership development. There are many things that are important to the success of a congregation, ministry, or organization but one is key: and that is leadership.

Some leaders are born. Don't believe them. Leadership is not biological. It is shaped and honed over time. Some rise to be very good leaders. These are generally the leaders that failed early and often and became better by learning, taking on new challenges and open to being coached. These are leaders who are hungry to improve their competency to lead. Leadership is a competency that is learned, practiced, and improved.

So how do leaders develop competency?

Often the church has relied on providing content and information to develop leaders. We send people to workshops and seminars, provide books for them to read, and the latest videos to view. Many are frustrated after participating in these experiences. They report they already knew the material taught or are things they have tried before. They find the workshops focused on theory and rarely offer practical steps for implementation.

Experience has taught us that providing information alone does not work. Becoming a competent leader takes a lot more than information.

Do people know how to learn?

YES!!! Ask a person something they do well, and they will tell you how they learned it. Most often they share the same core experiences.

• The individual wanted to learn and had a gold of becoming good at knitting, cooking, bowling, sailing, excel spreadsheets, teaching, writing, or any other trade, role, or hobby you can think of.

First Key to developing better leaders is that the person wants to improve in an area of leadership. Leadership development begins by identifying what people want to learn about leadership.

• The individual took time to learn about the subject. Generally, when they learn using methods of their preferred learning style, they learn best. Some like to learn by reading, some by listening, some by watching, and some by doing. We all have our own learning styles.

Second Key to developing better leaders is letting people tell you how they best learn. Assisting the individual in developing their learning plan that is applicable to their learning style and context has a much better chance of success.

 The individual applied the information right away. Within the workshop is best.

Third Key to developing better leaders is applying what you learn right away.

• The individual encountered a challenge that required practice, a mentor or coach, and further learning.

Fourth Key to developing better leaders is taking risks and making mistakes, and using a coach to understand and work through the challenges.

• The individual continues to practice the skill and once the leadership skill is developed, the individual is given a new challenge.

Fifth Key to developing better leaders is a new and harder challenge once the leader has overcome the initial challenge.

Ironically, this is the same process Jesus used to disciple his disciples. Jesus taught, challenged, and coached his disciples in living their faith among society. This learning process has been around for thousands of years. Why? Because it works. Unfortunately, the church has relied only on providing information. Not an effective means of developing leaders.

Leadership Development Process

GNJ continues to strengthen our ministry to develop leaders using the following process:

- People learn what they feel motivated to learn. Beginning with the leader's interests about their role and work assists in the learning process.
- Clarity about a leader's role and outcomes helps a leader focus their learning on things that matter to their effectiveness.
- Content, information, and understanding are essential for a leader but do not develop competency. People develop leadership skills and competency by practicing, executing, and receiving feedback.
- Challenges accelerate learning and competency when matched with support such as coaching, consultation, cohort groups, and mentoring.
- A leader's competency grows through the following process and the process does not necessarily occur in the same order for every person.
 - $\ensuremath{\checkmark}$ A leader identifies an area they want to improve.
 - ✓ A leader engages in learning about a particular leadership area by any of the following: reading, attending a workshop or seminar, watching videos, observing others.
 - ✓ A leader challenges them self or receives a challenge from a supervisor, coach or mentor to make progress in their leadership by helping their church/organization improve in an area of ministry.
 - ✓ The leader develops a personal plan and/or an organizational/ministry plan with the congregation/organization to improve an area of ministry.
 - ✓ The leader and the congregation/organization leaders receive coaching, consultation, and problem solving to achieve the goals of the plan.
 - ✓ Successes are celebrated.
 - ✓ Successes and challenges are evaluated for continual improvement.
 - ✓ The leader is given another opportunity to grow through the next right challenge.
 - ✓ The development process of (a) through (h) start over again.

GNJ leadership is prepared to assist your congregation through our discernment process as we emerge from the pandemic to assist your congregation to become an even more vital sustainable mission congregation. All of our Pathway programs develop leadership skills as we assist you in developing your congregation. Let's bring this to perspective with some questions and exercises:

- Think of a time when your Annual Conference received an equity or inclusivity report at the end of a session. Can you remember what the data presented stated? The resources used to gather and present that data were more than likely provided by GCSRW.
- Additionally, many people need assistance in navigating the complaint process for sexual misconduct. Do you know where to find it or how to point people to it? Our UMSexualEthics.com website has multiple resources that assist different parties in the complaint process. GCSRW has also developed an interactive "Do No More Harm" module to make all of our information easily accessible.
- Finally, list the number of churches in your area who have never been led by a Senior Pastor who is a woman. Has your congregation been in a similar situation? What would you say to one that is currently struggling to be welcoming and humble with a woman pastor? We encourage you to use an upcoming resource, "Welcoming a Woman Pastor", that tackles just that. This resource will be an online, interactive module designed to assist the local church in embracing a woman pastor.

While GCSRW does provide educational resources, tools for analyzing conduct and inclusivity at gatherings, leadership development trainings, and guidance in the prevention and response to sexual misconduct, we acknowledge the individual women and men that work to hold our church accountable.

We are proud of the work Greater New Jersey COSROWS do. We recognize their talents, time and efforts in creating an inclusive and equitable community of faith. We also

Future with Hope and its parent organization, the United Methodists of Greater New Jersey, work to identify and support Hope Centers: An ideal way of tackling social challenges in a sustainable, transformative way.

Hope Centers are new, emerging, or established community partnerships between and among United Methodist congregations, non-profit organizations, area businesses, and local government agencies. These Hope Centers tackle local problems through shared resources and strategic volunteerism, all on a foundation of asset-based community development.

Christian Outreach Project, a 501c3, is a Hope Center that has been operating in northwestern New Jersey for 40 years. According to the director, Dave Kihm, their mission is to provide free home repairs and renovations for people who do not have the means or resources to complete the work themselves. High school youth and adult chaperones donate their care and skills while learning and growing in the process.

Planning for the weeklong program, held the last week of June, begins in early September. Christian Outreach Project connects with social service agencies and churches throughout Warren, Sussex, and western Morris counties to identify potential homeowners.

This summer, 22 houses were recommended for repairs, but only seven were able to engage with the program due to volunteer capacity, logistics, and safety issues, among other factors.

48 participants from seven United Methodist churches (Branchville, Milton, Sparta, Morrow, New Dover, Succasunna) and two other non-

Methodist churches, repaired roofs, built a deck and stairs, installed kitchen tile, repaired masonry, built a well house, fixed a porch, built a mini ramp for accessibility, painted, and completed other carpentry repairs.

Volunteers stayed in cabins at Camp Hoover, a Girl Scout camp, and Frankford Plains UMC, Sparta UMC, Branchville UMC, Milton UMC, and Succasunna UMC generously prepared delicious homestyle meals such as barbeque chicken, spaghetti and meatballs, and macaroni and cheese each evening.

Every year, youth volunteers share that Christian Outreach Project is an extremely rewarding experience, and this summer was no exception. Despite the long hot days, the high school youth volunteers described highlights of the week as building relationships with other volunteers and homeowners, developing real home improvement skills, and the expansion of their world through helping neighbors and engaging in new situations.

Funding for Christian Outreach Project is raised through grants, donations, and participant fees. If you would like to donate or find out more about volunteering with the program next summer, visit **christianoutreachproject.org**.

Williams of the Susquehanna Annual Conference says because of time saved using Breakthrough she is "able to spend more time in mission." Danny Clark, lay leader of Trinity UMC of Tansboro, says "[Breakthrough] has given us so much more time to do ministry in the field and with the people instead of just planning Sunday for the entire week."

Extra time is always needed; a 24-hour day or even the standard window set aside for pastoral work never seem like enough time. The Rev. Joe Monahan, lead pastor of Medford UMC, noted how

his church, which "traditionally developed all its own stewardship materials," (including graphics, logos, customized letters, and commitment cards) found it difficult, especially during the pandemic, to "mobilize people to create all of those resources." He says, "Having a readymade package that could be quickly and easily tailored to our congregation was incredibly helpful." Ohio pastor,

Amy Gruber Ochier, said Breakthrough helped her manage being a ¼ time pastor while also working extra shifts at the hospital through COVID-19. Now that she is beginning a full-time appointment, she plans to use that time learning about the needs of the community where her new church is located.

Breakthrough also impacts the quality of ministry—from preaching to small groups to community outreach. The Rev. Scott Clifton, pastor of Groveville UMC and Debows UMC, says the series have, "helped bring inspiring and applicable messages to

the people," and "given me a tool and outline for sermons in times when I am not using a Breakthrough series." Pat Smith, Certified Lay Servant and member of Titusville UMC notes how the Breakthrough small group materials have enriched her weekly Bible study. "It is eye-opening and remarkable to dig deeper into the Bible passage that was preached on the preceding Sunday," she says. "I've learned a lot from the people [at the Bible study]," she says, "and it makes you feel closer [to your community]." In Pastor Gruber Ochier's last appointment, the Summer of Love

series sparked an incredible community outreach event that included worship, an ice cream social, a tie-dying activity led by college students, and the dedication of a new "blessing box" where community members can give and receive food and other needed items.

Ministry Matters Sew Much at Branchville UMC

dedicated group of crafters at
Branchville United Methodist
Church meet monthly to use
their sewing skills and brighten their
community. They gather to make colorful
pillowcases to donate to the emergency
departments at Newton and Hackettstown
Medical Centers, and the Sparta Cancer
Center. Incoming patients, both children and
adults, are asked if they would like to select their
own pillowcase. The pillowcases are usually cute
and fun patterns, reflect a hobby or interest, or are
seasonal prints.

This ministry of providing a personalized level of comfort during high-stress times is a gentle way of letting the patients know that someone they don't even know cares about them. The staff rave to the sewing group frequently about how much kids and the adults love them!

During Covid, the group made pillowcases at home, and distributed almost 1,000 face masks to local hospitals, nursing homes and senior living centers. After a period of sewing at home, the group is thankful to be back in person at the church, making pillowcases together again. They are also making fabric tote/shopping bags for the patrons of the Branchville food pantry.

Some of the monthly crafting members sew, cut fabric, pin, or press. When possible, the pillowcases are blessed during a Sunday worship service or other gathering before being delivered to the hospital. They also accept donations of fabric and funds to defray the costs of supplies.

In addition to pillowcases and masks, their crafters have made prayer quilts over many years to be given to family and friends of the church who are going through illness, surgery, or an especially emotional event. The impact of a hand-made gift provides comfort on a personal level. The quilts are made up of squares which each have a length of yarn in the center. Each quilt is prayed over during worship and the yarn strings are tied by members of the congregation after church as they say a silent prayer.

It is their great hope that these small gifts of time and talent will reach out to the community and reflect Jesus' love for them. ■

Prayer quilts are presented for congregational prayer and blessing during Sunday worship. At the end of worship, the congregation is invited to come and say a personal prayer for the quilt recipient by tying a bow on the quilt.


We hope they bring some color and lift the spirits of those hospitalized and are given to the patients to take home with them when discharged.







Each chapter ends with two sets of questions: one for personal reflection and one for group reflection.




Cultivating Compassion Trevor Hudson


Have you ever stopped praying?


